



#### Beginning U.S. Research

#### Barbara Hovorka

- I. Selecting the problem and recording basic data
  - Decide on a particular genealogical problem and record known facts in the pedigree and family group form.
    - i. Use personal knowledge and memory as a start
    - ii. Contact relatives, associates, and old timers for additional facts
    - iii. Consider family tradition and investigate documents in the home
    - iv. Establish a continuing program to investigate family/home sources
  - Initiate a good note keeping system where all research activity can be properly identified and recorded
    - Document all research activity; making abstracts, extracts, and copy-work neatly and accurately
    - ii. Consider filing correspondence and research; findings by name, locality or record type.
    - iii. Post research findings to the pedigree, family group sheet, and summary forms as research
    - v.
- II. Determining the extent of previous research.
  - a. Initiate searches to locate pertinent family history already in print
    - i. Use the "surname and locality and target approach" in repositories visited.
    - ii. Check genealogical dictionaries, indexes, and compendia
    - iii. Investigate published biographical works and genealogical periodicals.
    - iv. Search appropriate local and regional histories.
  - b. Investigate general collections of the LDS Family History Society early in research and recheck them when new facts are located. (on film at FHC's or online at <a href="https://www.familysearch.org">www.familysearch.org</a>)
    - i. Investigate the appropriate names through the Ancestral file.
    - ii. Check the Family Search, i.e. IGI or International Genealogical Index.
    - iii. Use locality and surname searches in the FHLC (Family History Library Catalog.
  - If the problem was associated with LDS Church history, make an exhaustive study of the following special LDS collections
    - i. Membership records
    - ii. Emigration records
    - iii. Ordinance records
    - iv. Records of the church Historian
    - v. Miscellaneous "Early Church and Utah" records
- III. Evaluating Survey Data and Defining Research Objectives
  - a. Evaluate all survey data and reconcile apparent discrepancies
    - i. List conflicting information in summary form for better evaluation
    - ii. Correlate survey data with known facts and define specific objectives for continued research
  - b. Determine and list correct locality information for each place-name associated with the problem
    - i. Consult a good marketing guide, atlas, or postal guide for correct facts
    - ii. Consult a good gazetteer, guide book, or local history for correct town and county information detail
  - c. Determine and list major genealogical sources which exist for pertinent jurisdictions and initiate searches in them
    - Consider local repositories, state and national repositories, as well as the LDS Family History Library and its centers.
    - ii. Plan to use correspondence, agents and to do personal research

- IV. Gaining New Facts and Data
  - Consider vital, church and cemetery records; working from the more modern events to those earlier
    - Locate and obtain death certificates and obituary notices for those persons who died in a modern period
    - ii. Investigate towns, counties and states pertaining to the problem
  - Locate the individual or family(s) of interest in existing census records and be prepared to recheck the records from time to time as new facts are located
    - i. Search the 1850-1920 enumerations first, then to earlier records
    - ii. Use local and state records where they exist to supplement federal records
    - iii. Have searches made in modern confidential census records when needed
  - Investigate probate and civil-criminal court records for supplemental birth, marriage, death, and kinship information
    - i. Consider all possible locations of residence
    - ii. Search probate indexes, will books and case files
    - iii. Investigate civil-criminal court indexes, docket books, order books, and case files
  - d. Search land-property records of the appropriate jurisdictions for kinship information, facts about family migration and movement, as well as for other important historical information
    - Search deed and mortgage records; extracting or abstracting pertinent information from the records
    - ii. Consider plat books, tax records, survey records, warrants, grants and land patents
  - e. Check existing military records for service or pension files relating to individuals of interest
    - Search published and microfilmed indexes to records of early years; i.e. the Revolution, the War of 1812, or Civil War
    - ii. Obtain photo copies or microfilmed copies of pertinent files from the Nation or state archives
    - iii. Check microfilm copies of pension and bounty land-warrant application files through the LDS Family History Library or Centers
    - iv. Investigate records of modern wars through selected federal records centers and the
  - f. Locate and investigate extant Emigration records which might possibly pertain to the problem
    - Many records relating to the colonial period of American history have already been published
    - ii. Lists of passengers arriving at most Atlantic and gulf coast ports after about 1820 are on file in the National Archives
    - The LDS Family History Library has microfilm copies of ship passenger lists for the ports of Boston, Baltimore, Philadelphia, and New Orleans for the period 1820-1876
  - g. Consider miscellaneous social-commercial records which might pertain to the problem and initiate a continuing program to investigate them
    - i. Search records of appropriate hospitals, schools, and fraternal organizations
    - ii. Investigate pertinent business-employment agencies and organizations for new information
  - h. Consider re-evaluating all previous research from time to time to see if your skill has increased or new avenues of research have opened since original work was started on that particular family
    - Check the census records often as you find new families to see if marriages were entered into the "the boy or girl next door."
    - ii. Check land records for the families around a known ancestor to see if new information points to "the neighbors" as a possible connection.

#### RECORDS SELECTION TABLE

Table below can help you decide which records to search. It is most helpful for post 1800 research. In column 1 find the goal you selected. Then in column 2 the types of records that are likely to have the information you need. Aditional records that may also be useful are listed in column 3. The terms used in columns 2 and 3 are the same as the subject headings used in this outline and in the locality section of the FHLC.

Records containing previous research (genealogy, biography, history, periodicals, and societies) could provide information for nearly all of the goals. These have not been repeatedly listed unless they are especially helpful for the goal.


#### Where to Write for Vital Records

#### Genealogical Form of Oregon, Inc. HOW TO FIND A BIRTH DATE FROM A DEATH DATE

Submitted by Ellen Benedict (by permission)

Many times on a tombstone or other death record, you will find an ancestor's age recorded you will find an ancestor's age recorder as 82 yrs. 9 mos. and 7 days. How do you figure the birth date?

You will set up an equation. On the top line, put the year of death, then the month number, then days. Directly under those figures write the age: first the years, then the months, then days.

EXAMPLE:

The death date is:

9 Sep 1893

The age is:

82 yrs. 2 mos. 7 days

Death date

9 1893 9

Age

7 2

or: 2 Jul 1811 as the birth date

But not all dates will be that easily subtracted.

EXAMPLE:

The death date is:

4 June 1896

The age is:

77 yrs. 2 mos. 8 days

Death date

1896 6

Age

77 2 8

Since 8 is larger than 4, we must borrow a month. Since the month is June, it has 30 days, so we are borrowing 30 days from the 6 mos. Change the 6 mos. into 5 mos. and 30 days to the 4 days. The equation would then look like this:

Death date

34 1896 6

Age

8 26

or: 26 Mar. 1819 as the birth date.

THE NUMBERS WITHIN THE YEAR CAN BE BORROWED AS YOU WOULD ANY SUBTRACTION PROBLEM.

But what happens if the equation looks like this:

Death date

1892 2 12

Age

78 6 9

We now need to borrow a whole year. We need to put that into months, so we are borrowing 12 months from 1892. Remembering to change the last digit of the year, the equation will look like this:

Death date

12 1891 14

Age

or: 3 Aug. 1813 as the birth date

30 days hath September, April, June and November; all he rest have 31 except February with 28, but one more one year in four.
